Dear Chairman Capito and Ranking Member Coons:

We are writing to express our strong support for the State Trade Expansion Program (STEP) grant program at the Small Business Administration. As you begin work on the fiscal year 2018 appropriations bill for Financial Services and General Government, we respectfully request your support for increased levels of funding for the STEP program.

The STEP program was originally created in the *Small Business Jobs Act of 2010* (P.L. 111-240) and provides invaluable support to small businesses. STEP awards competitive grants to states and territories in an effort to increase the number of small businesses offering their products overseas. States then match a portion of these grants and award funds to small businesses. By lowering some of the barriers to exporting, the program has helped increase the number of U.S. small businesses that are selling their products overseas and the value of their exports. According to the Small Business Administration, the STEP grant program yielded over \$300 million in export sales for a return on federal taxpayer investment of nearly 38:1. Through this program, small businesses around the country have been able to expand their markets, grow their businesses and create new jobs.


Recognizing the success of this program and the importance of ensuring that small businesses have access to foreign markets, Congress authorized STEP through 2020 at \$30 million per fiscal year as part of the *Trade Facilitation and Trade Enforcement Act of 2015* (P.L. 114-125). We strongly believe that the enactment of this authorization demonstrates Congress' commitment to the STEP grant program and support for increased levels of funding.

As you know, exports play a critical role in our economy. The Department of Commerce reports that exports accounted for one-fourth of overall economic growth since 2009 and supported 11.5 million American jobs in 2015. Despite the enormous potential of exporting, only 300,000 of the 28 million small business in the United States utilize international markets and export their products. With 95 percent of potential consumers living outside our borders, we are missing out on opportunities to expand our economy and support our small businesses. The STEP grant program helps bridge this gap and ensure that small businesses are able to benefit from growing markets abroad.



We know the subcommittee may weigh the effectiveness and efficiency of all programs in its decision process, and we believe the STEP program has proven to be a good investment of taxpayers' dollars and has a demonstrated record of success in helping small business grow and expand their markets overseas.
