A BILL

To establish a grant program relating to the prevention of student and student athlete opioid misuse.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Student and Student
- 5 Athlete Opioid Misuse Prevention Act".
- 6 SEC. 2. GRANTS FOR OPIOID MISUSE PREVENTION.
- 7 Part A of title V of the Public Health Service Act
- 8 (42 U.S.C. 290aa et seq.) is amended by adding at the
- 9 end the following:

1	"SEC. 506B. GRANTS FOR STUDENT AND STUDENT ATHLETE
2	OPIOID MISUSE PREVENTION.
3	"(a) Authority.—The Assistant Secretary, in con-
4	sultation with the Secretary of Education, may make
5	grants to, and enter into contracts and cooperative agree-
6	ments with, public and nonprofit private entities, including
7	States and drug-free community coalitions, to enable such
8	entities—
9	"(1) to carry out school-based programs con-
10	cerning the dangers of the misuse of and addiction
11	to prescription opioids, related drugs, and other pre-
12	scribed drugs commonly used in pain management
13	or injury recovery, including initiatives that give stu-
14	dents the responsibility to create their own anti-drug
15	abuse education programs for their schools;
16	"(2) to carry out community-based misuse and
17	addiction prevention programs relating to prescrip-
18	tion opioids, related drugs, and other prescription
19	drugs commonly used in pain management or injury
20	recovery, including youth sports organizations; and
21	"(3) to carry out school, collegiate, and commu-
22	nity-based engagement of youth, high school, or col-
23	legiate athletic and recreation programs and associa-
24	tions concerning the dangers of the misuse of and
25	addiction to prescription opioids, related drugs, and
26	other prescription drugs commonly used in pain

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1	management or injury recovery, including initiatives
2	that give student athletes the responsibility to create
3	their own anti-drug abuse education programs for
4	their schools.
5	"(b) Use of Funds.—Amounts made available
6	under a grant, contract, or cooperative agreement under
7	subsection (a) shall be used for planning, establishing, or
8	administering prevention programs relating to prescrip-
9	tion opioid, related drugs, and other drugs commonly used
10	in pain management or injury recovery.
11	"(c) Use of Funds.—Amounts provided to an entity
12	under this section may be used—
13	"(1) to carry out school-based programs that
14	are focused on school districts with high or increas-
15	ing rates of misuse of and addiction to prescription
16	and nonprescription opioids, and targeted at popu-
17	lations that are most at risk to start misusing such
18	drugs;
19	"(2) to carry out community-based prevention
20	programs that are focused on populations within the
21	community that are most at risk for misuse of and
22	addiction to prescription and nonprescription
23	opioids;
24	"(3) to carry out school-based prevention pro-
25	grams that are focused on student athletes and the

1	risk of misuse of and addiction to prescription and
2	nonprescription opioids as part of injury recovery
3	and pain management;
4	"(4) to carry out community-based programs
5	that are focused on youth athletes and the risk of
6	misuse of and addiction to prescription and non-
7	prescription opioids as part of injury recovery and
8	pain management;
9	"(5) to carry out collegiate-based programs that
10	are focused on collegiate athletes, including club
11	sports and recreation sports, and the risk for misuse
12	of and addiction to prescription and nonprescription
13	opioids as part of injury recovery and pain manage-
14	ment;
15	"(6) to assist local government entities to con-
16	duct appropriate prevention activities relating to
17	youth and the risk for misuse of and addiction to
18	prescription and nonprescription opioids as part of
19	injury recovery and pain management; and
20	"(7) to train and educate State and local offi-
21	cials; youth athletics organizers and coaches; school
22	administrators, teachers, athletic directors, coaches,
23	and athletic trainers; collegiate administrators, ath-
24	letic directors, directors of campus recreation, coach-
25	es, athletic trainers, and campus-based medical pro-

viders, on the signs of misuse of prescription and nonprescription opioids and the options for treatment and prevention of such misuse.

"(d) Allocation and Report.—

"(1) Prevention program allocation.—
Not more than \$500,000 of the amount appropriated in each fiscal year to carry out this section shall be made available to the Assistant Secretary, acting in consultation with other Federal agencies, to support and conduct periodic analyses and evaluations of effective prevention programs for misuse of and addiction to opioids, related drugs, and other drugs commonly used for pain management and the development of appropriate strategies for disseminating information about and implementing such programs.

"(2) Report.—The Assistant Secretary shall annually prepare and submit to the Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions, the Committee on the Judiciary, and the Committee on Appropriations of the Senate, and the Committee on Energy and Commerce, the Committee on the Judiciary, and the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives, a report on the prevention programs and development of strategies described in

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1	paragraph (1), containing, as appropriate, the re-
2	sults of the analyses and evaluations conducted
3	under paragraph (1).
4	"(e) Authorization of Appropriations.—There
5	is authorized to be appropriated to carry out this section—
6	((1) \$10,000,000 for fiscal year 2021; and
7	"(2) such sums as may be necessary for each
8	succeeding fiscal year.".
